<u>Serjeant ARTHUR SAMUEL HALLING</u> 5182953, *Gloucestershire* Regiment who died age 23 on 31 August 1940 Remembered with honour at the PORTLAND ROYAL NAVAL CEMETERY

Incorrectly identified as H. Halling, **Arthur Samuel Halling** was born 11 April 1917 in coal mining area of Tredegar, South Wales because his father, Samuel along with mother, Sarah Ann, found no work in Tewkesbury during World War I.¹ After the family of six children returned to Tewkesbury, he attended the Abbey Boys School in Oldbury Road and then worked for Bargus' Fish and Chip Shop.²

As with many others between the wars, when work was very scare in Tewkesbury, he joined the Gloucestershire Regiment, aged 17.5 (but having to pretend to be 18). Whilst serving in Plymouth, he met wife, Doris. When the phoney war ended in April 1940, Doris was heavily pregnant and so Samuel was not allowed to go France. In any case, he was due to be promoted to Company Sergeant Major, in charge of **Belisha Boys³** at nearby Portland. Four of his Tewkesbury friends (one was **Charles Belcher**) were sent to France to join the Dunkirk campaign, during which they became POWs in Stalag VIII. The accident that killed him on 31 August 1940 followed the shooting down of a German fighter plane.⁴ He and a colleague pursued it, but were killed in a collision with bus: his mate lost two legs. Samuel Halling was killed with his C.S.M.'s badges in pocket.⁵ His

posthumous son, *Arthur Brian Halling*, is still alive in Plymouth; Doris married again but stayed in touch and died c 2003.
